History Trip



On Tuesday 6th February year 11 History GCSE students attended a revision and examination skills workshop at the Waterside Arts Centre in Sale. The workshop, called 'The Doctors' Show' is run by School History Scene. This is an historical theatre group led by

Josh Brooman, one of the historians who developed the SHP History course that we follow at New Mills.

Students were reminded of the background and context of the 'Peoples' Health' course, including the treatments for the Black Death and the Great Plague of London, and were asked to take part in assessing the contributions of individuals to the development of medicine. They also got some training on how to mark exam papers, and were very accurate when asked to give the correct marks and levels for a range of GCSE style answers. All our students seem to have a really good grasp of the GCSE examination demands.

As well as seeing the sights of Sale! We also got the chance to examine the uniforms of other schools, including a very attractive tweed and plaid number that we have decided to recommend to Mrs McGloin as the next New Mills ensemble.

Art Department Year 11 3D Workshop

Our art department artist in residence Amanda Whewell worked with 5 of our talented 3D GCSE students in just one week to produce a group of mixed-media jelly fish from thread, string, PVA glue and textiles. Students learnt how to use a sewing machine and to dye their own fabric with beautiful results. The final 3D pieces will show a positive impact on their 60% coursework grade and enriches the work in their individual sea-life projects, bringing to life the sketches and observational drawings inspired by a range of eclectic contemporary artists. Throughout this project pupils have produced a series of etchings in the style if the artist Debby Mason, ink and bleach illustrations, wire work in the style of Sarah Graham and Catherine Gontier alongside more traditional sketchbook work in paint and oil pastel.

Science News

Moon Rock and Meteorites land at New Mills School



Pupils from New Mills School got their hands on rare samples of moon rocks and meteorites during a series of science lessons which were truly out of this world. These rare samples were provided free of charge by the UK's Science and Technology Facilities Council (STFC), which provides educational packs in a bid to inspire young people to get involved in science and complement classroom studies.

The classroom sessions for year 7, 8 and GCSE Astronomy students were led by Dr Nigel Marshall who teaches the GCSE Astronomy at New Mills School.

The sessions culminated in a successful and busy moon watch evening where GCSE Astronomy students at the school invited local Primary School children and their parents for a space themed evening of activities.

Over 250 pupils and their parents were given the unique opportunity to actually touch a piece of space rock not of this Earth as they were allowed to handle some genuine meteorites.

The pack provided by STFC includes a 1.2 billionyear-old piece of Mars rock and a 4.3 billion-year-old nickel meteorite. It is unlikely that students will ever get the chance to hold an object older than this, as Earth itself was formed 4.6 billion years ago.

The lunar samples were collected in the late 1960s and early 1970s during some of NASA's first manned space missions to the Moon. During these missions, a staggering 382kg of material was brought back to Earth – mostly for use by scientists, but small quantities are used to develop educational packs like this one.

We are so pleased that so many people came along to participate in this event. Samples like these can tell us a great deal about the planets from which they originate, but there is still much to learn – and we hope these kind of experiences will encourage students to become the next generation of astronomers."

STFC's Chief Executive Officer, Dr Brian Bowsher, said: "We are thrilled to be able to offer this unique opportunity to young people.

"It is not often they will be able to see close-up, and actually touch, such important fragments of science history.

"Samples like these are vital in teaching us more about our solar system, allowing us to turning theories into fact.



"We hope this experience will encourage the students to take up a career in science."

STFC is the only authorised source to loan lunar samples to educational and scientific organisations in the UK.



The Meteorites

Meteorites are pieces of rock from space that fall to Earth. They come from a variety of places and the Science and Technology Facilities Council's collection includes samples from the main asteroid belt between Jupiter and Mars, from the Moon and even one from Mars.

Mars has fascinated people for thousands of years and in June 2003 the European Space Agency launched Mars Express, a mission to study the Red Planet in detail, which a number of British scientists have worked on. Mars Express arrived at its destination at the end of 2003 and is now sending back exciting information, including evidence of methane, that might point to the existence of life:



ZZZZZZZZ..... (at night, not in the day)

Not enough sleep?

Not sleeping enough affects your mood, can make it difficult for you to concentrate, affects your memory capacity, slows down your Reaction time and stunts creativity

> Make sure you get enough sleep. Teenagers need more sleep than adults and should aim for at least 9 hours a night. So, if you are going to be up in time for school you have to go to bed a bit earlier. (10p.m. to be getting up after 7 a.m.) Your brain needs sleep to engage efficiently in something called "pruning" where it gets rid of all the connections it doesn't need to make it more efficient. It creates motorways for your thoughts to make your brain work faster and better.

Sleep Hygiene

1 Stop playing on your phone or PC at least an hour before you are going to go to sleep. Blue light from electronic devices, stimulates brain activity rather than relaxes it and prevents you from sleeping.

2 Put all electronic devices in a central place in the house to charge overnight so you are not tempted to keep checking in.

3 Have a routine of relaxation before you go to bed; have a warm shower or bath, have a warm or milky drink (caffeine-free!); read a book or a magazine.

4 Don't exercise close to bed-time, but 10 minutes of aerobic exercise during the day, will improve sleep patterns.

5 Try relaxation and breathing exercises to promote sleepiness. Try 7-11 breathing – breathe in through your nose for a count of 7 and out through your mouth for a count of 11. Repeat 5 times

Eeek!! Exams!!! Take your time!!

Where students have learning difficulties, which might reasonably be expected to have a substantial adverse effect on their ability to take an examination, the school may apply for that student to be granted what are called access arrangements. These are adjustments to the conduct of an examination which enable a student to be able to do that examination in a fair way, but not to give them an unfair advantage.

The intention behind an access arrangement is to meet the needs of an individual candidate without affecting the integrity of an assessment – i.e., they allow candidates with special educational needs, disabilities or temporary injuries to access the assessment and show what they know and can do, without affecting the integrity of that assessment.

School must provide evidence of that need and the nature of the required adjustment often in the form of an official assessment by a specialist teacher-assessor. In general, these assessments take place in year 9.

Typically, a student may be granted some extra time, use of a word processor, or a reader or be able to take the exam in a smaller room. A student may not need all the arrangements available to them in every exam. The format of some exams might mean that the adjustment given would not help the student. (e.g. word-processing in a multiple-choice assessment.)

It is important that students understand how to use those arrangements. For example, in relation to extra time, a student should allocate additional time to every question and not charge through the paper and then be left with time at the end. The additional time enables the student to read a question carefully, re-read it and have time to interpret the meaning. So, for example, where a 10-mark question would usually take 20 minutes to do, a student with additional time granted, should plan to take 25 minutes.

So, Year 11s, plan your time effectively to maximise your chance of success!!
